


Six Strategies for Effective Learning

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All of these strategies have supporting evidence from cognitive psychology. For each strategy, we explain how to do it, some points to consider, and where to find more information.







Spaced Practice

SPACE OUT VOUR STUDVING OVER TIME


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HOW TO DO IT

Start planning early for exams, and set aside a little bit of time every day. Five hours spread out over two weeks is better than the same five hours all at once.



Review information from each class, but not immediately after class.



After you review information from the most recent class, make sure to go back and study important older information to keep it fresh.



HOLD ON!



When you sit down to study, make sure you are using effective study strategies rather than just re-reading your class notes.



This may seem difficult and you may forget some information from day to day, but this is actually a good thing! This forces you to retrieve information from memory (see Retrieval Practice poster).



Create small spaces (a few days) and do a little bit over time, so that it adds up!

Retrieval Practice

PRACTICE BRINGING INFORMATION TO MIND

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HOW TO DO IT

Put away your class materials, and write or sketch everything you know. Be as thorough as possible. Then, check your class materials for accuracy and important points you missed.



Take as many practice tests as you can get your hands on. If you don't have ready-made tests, try making your own and trading with a friend who has done the same.



You can also make flashcards. Just make sure you practice recalling the information on them, and go beyond definitions by thinking of links between ideas



HOLD ON!



Retrieval practice works best when you go back to check your class materials for accuracy afterward.



Retrieval is hard! If you're struggling, identify the things you've missed from your class materials, and work your way up to recalling it on your own with the class materials closed.



Don't only recall words and definitions. Make sure to recall main ideas, how things are related or different from one another, and new examples.

Elaboration

EXPLAIN AND DESCRIBE IDEAS WITH MANY DETAILS

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


HOW TO DO IT


Ask yourself questions while you are studying about how things work and why, and then find the answers in your class materials and discuss them with your classmates.



As you elaborate, make connections between different ideas to explain how they work together. Take two ideas and think of ways they are similar and different.



Describe how the ideas you are studying apply to your own experiences or memories. As you go through your day, make connections to the ideas you are learning in class.



HOLD ON!



Make sure the way you are explaining and describing an idea is accurate. Don't overextend the elaborations, and always check your class materials or ask your teacher.



Work your way up so that you can describe and explain without looking at your class materials.

Interleaving

SWITCH BETWEEN IDEAS WHILE YOU STUDY

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HOW TO DO IT

Switch between ideas during a study session. Don't study one idea for too long.











Go back over the ideas again in different orders to strengthen your understanding.







Make links between different ideas as you switch between them.







While it's good to switch between ideas, don't switch too often, or spend too little time on any one idea; you need to make sure you understand them.



Interleaving will feel harder than studying the same thing for a long time. But don't worry - this is actually helpful to your learning!

Concrete Examples

USE SPECIFIC EXAMPLES TO UNDERSTAND ABSTRACT IDEAS

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HOW TO DO IT

Collect examples your teacher has used, and look in your class materials for as many examples as you can find.



Make the link between the idea you are studying and each example, so that you understand how the example applies to the idea.



Share examples with friends, and explain them to each other for added benefits.



HOLD ON



You may find examples on the internet that are not used appropriately. Make sure your examples are correct - check with your teacher.



Ultimately, creating your own relevant examples will be the most helpful for learning.

Dual Coding

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HOW TO DO IT



Look at your class materials and find visuals. Look over the visuals and compare to the words.



Look at visuals, and explain in your own words what they mean.



Take information that you are trying to learn, and draw visuals to go along with it.

HOLD ON!

Try to come up with different ways to represent the information visually, for example an infographic, a timeline, a cartoon strip, or a diagram of parts that work together.

Use your time to prepare, rehearse and develop your Component 1 performance pieces and your Component 2 compositions.

The music room is available at specific lunchtimes and after school each Wednesday and Friday to practice and use Soundtrap on the computers

Component 1 – Performance pieces (top tips!)

Practice your pieces regularly, know and include all performance and expression directions in your pieces. Have scores for all your performance pieces. Be ready to have your performances recorded.

Deadlines: Performances recording 1 - **Thursday 19**th **December 2024,** Performances recording 2 - **Friday 14**th **March 2025**

Component 2 – Composition (top tips!)

Know how your compositions relate to the briefs. Keep your composition logs up-to-date. Include dynamics, tempo, articulation and expression directions markings onto your scores. Save your compositions as an mp3.

Deadlines: Free choice composition - **Friday 25**th **October 2024,** Set brief composition - **Friday 14**th **February 2025**

The examination will comprise of 2 full papers, each will have four sections; Christian Beliefs, Matters of Life and death, Marriage and the family and Living the Christian life. The second paper is Muslim Beliefs, Crime and Punishment, Peace and Conflict and Living the Muslim Life.

Spend around 25 minutes answering each section. Read the question carefully – if it says two reasons only give two! Link back to the question in the 12 mark question. Learn all keywords. Focus on SPAG on the 12 mark questions. Time questions carefully – follow the number of mark available.

Keywords such as salvation/atonement/al Qadr/ Sawm/ Eucharist need to be learnt.

Write your outline answer in full sentences. This is the 3 mark question.

Use mind maps to recap knowledge for revision.

Learn 5-10 key teachings for each religion and consider how they could apply them to different topics.

Create practice answers to evaluation questions by creating three reasons for and against each topic.

Use a key controversial or memory image in the centre of a page, for example, an electric chair and use it to create a piece of revision for and against the death penalty.

Practice example question answers.

Look at previous assessment feedback, practice weakness areas.

Try ideas suggested on the revision handouts and ask your teacher if you would like additional help or more practice on a particular skill.

Conversation booklets: your conversation will be based on the questions you have practised. You will be asked questions from theme 2 and either theme 1 or 3. You must also ASK a question during the conversation! You can practise one question to include OR remember to use 'and you?' in French/Spanish. The conversation booklets also help you to prepare for the writing exam as the topics are the same!

Choose a picture with people in and practise writing and talking about it. Vary the locations eg. restaurants, school, work settings... Use WPALM to help! Your teacher will provide some sample role plays for you to use and prepare. GCSE revision guides: use the guides to help you to learn vocabulary and revisit grammar points. There are also exam style questions for you to try. Listening to music and TV programmes in the target language can be great to help you to 'tune in' to authentic speakers. Why not try switching your Netflix profile to Spanish and watch a show you are familiar with?

Flashcards: these can be really useful for items of vocabulary (create packs for each topic) – write the French/Spanish on one side and then add the English to the other side – now test yourself! You can also do this to support your learning of the conversation booklet topics.

DuoLingo can be useful for some revision 'on the go'! The sentences can be very random but it is useful for practising verbs and individual items of vocabulary.

Photographs/images: choose any picture and practise writing and talking about it. Choose a picture with people in and vary the locations e.g. restaurants, school, work settings... Use **WPALM** to help! Start off with 'Iss tasveer maiN...'

Ask Mr Hussain for additional past papers for Urdu.

Music and film/TV: watching a drama and TV programmes in the target language can be great to help you to 'tune in' to authentic speakers, especially with English subtitles. Why not try switching your Netflix profile to Urdu/Hindi dubbing and watch a show you are familiar with?
